

From the Pastor's Desk

I was really fascinated by the Linn book, Good Ghosts, when it talked about the relationship between fear of hell and addictions. The Linn's are psychologists with two of them steeped in Catholic theology as are all Jesuits. The beauty of that combination is that theology is usually grasped from an intellectual perspective while psychiatric expertise deals with the emotional or irrational realm to which the intellectual perspective often comes up quite lacking. When we talk about addictions, a psychiatrist can understand the "gray" subtleties of inner motivations that a theologian can only see more or less as "black or white", sin or virtue. Having said that let's return to the Linn Q and A and that relationship.

Besides addictions, how is the fear of hell related to emotional illness in general?

The fear of abandonment and not belonging, based on the belief that we are loved only on condition that we are "good," underlies not only addictions but most, if not all, emotional illness. We first learn this fear with our human parents and then we are likely to project it onto God. The great Swiss psychiatrist Paul Tournier writes, "Fear of losing the love of God—this is the essence of our human problem and of psychology." As Bernard Cooke says, psychological health demands that we know God is "absolutely faithful and unswerving in a compassionate love of us humans. God does not go from being displeased with us to being once more friendly; God is infinitely above being offended and does not ask to be a appeased. God's forgiveness is not a response to our admission of guilt and our conversion; it is their cause.

"In some ways a loving parent's way of dealing with a child gives us an insight into the divine attitude toward human sin: while the parent will lead the young person to recognition of misdeeds and at a certain age to a sense of culpability, while the parent will work to help the child change to a better attitude and a better pattern of behavior, the parent's forgiveness of the child does not wait for some appeal for that forgiveness. Instead, the forgiveness is assumed even before the child's "sin." It is never retracted at any point and is a personal force that energizes the parent's effort to lead the child toward moral responsibility."

Punishment Never Heals, Only Love can heal. Question: If fear of punishment can never change a person, why does the bible tell us to fear God? Some justify the use of fear to control others' behavior by saying that the scriptures tell us to "fear God." However, the word that we translate as "fear," in expressions like "fear of the Lord" (phobos), is not the experience of being intimidated by another. According to William Barclay, phobos, in relation to God, would be better translated "awesome respect," meaning loving wonder (e.g., Ps. 103:11-17).

We are all Good Goats. Question: Matthew 25 is the passage I've most often heard quoted to prove that some people go to heaven and some people go to hell. Can you give me any more evidence for your interpretation? Deak's interpretation of Matthew 25:31-46 is similar to ours. He says that sheep and goats represent not two different groups of persons, but two realities that coexist within every person, "realized goodness" and "past failures."

We recognize that this way of understanding Matthew 25 does not exhaust the meaning of the passage. We cannot deny the historical dimension, the "not yet," of revelation, and say that the kingdom of God is *only* within us in our current experience. However, we can say that it is *also* within us in our present experience. Thus our present inner experience is essential information for our effort to understand the mysteries of heaven and hell.

On the other hand, Dalton does take the passage in the more historical sense, as referring to two groups of persons. He sees the message to the goats as a warning, not as a statement of what will actually happen. Referring to the situation of the goats, he says, "it is not affirmed that any human being, given the grace and mercy of God, ever arrives at this desperate situation."

The great scripture scholar William Barclay described himself as a "convinced universalist." Commenting on Matthew 25:46, in which the goats on the left hand are sent away to "eternal punishment," he says that what is meant... This will be continued in next week's column
